Mritiman, a, m. mortality.

Mrityu, us, m. (ep. also f.), death, dying, decease, demise, (a hundred kinds of death are enumerated from disease or accident, and one natural kind from old age); Death personified, the god of death, Yama the judge of the dead; an epithet of Vishnn; N. of a son of A-dharma by Nir-piti; an epithet of Brahma; N. of Māyā; of Kali; of a teacher; of Vyāsa in the sixth Dyapara; of one of the eleven Rudras; of an Ekāha; of the eighth astrological house; of the seventeenth astrological Yoga; the god of love [cf. mara]; mrityor harah and mrityor vikarna-bhase, names of Samans; akala-mrityu, 'untimely death,' N. of a being attendant on Padma-pāṇi. - Mrityuhanya, f. the goddess of death. - Mrityu-jit, t, m. conqueror of death,' N. of an author, (also called Mrityujid-bhattaraka); N. of a work by the same anthor. - Mrityun-jaya, as, ā, am, overcoming death; (as), m. 'death-conqueror,' an epithet of Siva; N. of an author. - Mrityunjaya-tirtha and mrityu-tirtha, am, n., N. of two Tirthas. - Mrityuturya, am, n. a kind of drum beaten at funeral ceremonies. - Mrityu-da, as, ā, am, death-giving, fatal. - Mrityu-dūta, as, m., Ved. ' death-messenger,' one who brings the news of a death. - Mrituudvāra, am, n. death's door, the door that leads to death. - Mrityu-nāśaka, as, m. 'death-averter,' quicksilver. - Mrityu-nāsana, am, n. death-destroying, the drink of immortality. - Mrityu-patha, as, m. a way or path leading to death. - Mrityu-pa, ās, m. 'death-flowered,' the sugar cane (so called because it dies after the loss of its flowers). - Mrstyu-pratibaddha, as, ā, am, subject or liable to death. - Mrityu-phala, as, m. a species of cucumber, = mahā-kāla = mahākālaphala; (ā or i), f. the plantain, Musa Sapientum; (am), n, a sort of fruit considered as poisonous. - Mrityu-bandhu, us, m., Ved. 'companion of death,' a man. - Mrstyu-bija, see mrityu-vija. - Mrityu-bhanguraka, as, m. a drum beaten at funeral ceremonies. - Mrityu-bhaya, am, n. danger or peril of death; fear of death. - Mrityu-bhita, as, a, am, afraid of death. - Mrityu-bhritya, as, m. a servant of death; (figuratively) sickness, malady, disease. - Mrityu-mat, an, ati, at, having death, subject to death. - Mrityu-mara, as, m. Mriksha, as, m., Ved. (perhaps) a curry-comb, comb or any instrument for scraping; (according to Say. on Rig-veda VIII. 66, 3) purifying, cleansing; rubbed, cleansed (= sodhaka, pra-kshālita).

Mrikshaha-nāṭaha, am, n., N. of a Nāṭaka. Mrikshiṇi, f. (perhaps fr. rt. mrahsh, in the sense of 'tearing up the ground'), Ved. (perhaps) a rapid
